A health group gives a new mother a lifeline

Ricarda gave birth to her first child, a girl called Ramírez. Life as a single mother was hard. With no husband to support her, she was left to fend for herself, her newborn baby and the rest of her family.

Thanks to generous sponsors like you, Ricarda was able to get vital help and support. Joining a local health group, she went along to postnatal classes and nutrition training, getting the support she so desperately needed. Ricarda can't talk owing to a severe speech impediment, but she didn't let that stop her.

"I take my little girl to the health centre for check-ups. Although I cannot speak, my neighbours understand me and help the doctors and nurses understand what I need," she said. "I help my family by taking care of our goats, sheep and cows every day." She makes sure the whole family are looked after, having three hearty meals a day.

Thank you for supporting mothers like Ricarda when they need it most. Babies are now growing up strong and healthy, and their mothers are now well equipped to look after them.

We've come a long way, and we're still making progress — *all thanks to you*.


We've been working with the community of Khantati since **2006**. Back then, children faced many problems: malnutrition; low household incomes; social and emotional isolation; and, sadly for a few, little support from their parents.

Since then, things have begun to change for the better. More families grow nutritious food, so their children are better nourished; schools have new equipment and have become more welcoming places for children; and teachers have been trained, so they can help children to reach their full potential and be successful later on in life.

Despite these improvements, life is still hard for your sponsored child, and we really need your continuing support to ensure all the good we have managed to achieve for them isn't lost.

Thanks to your incredibly generous sponsorship of your sponsored child, we can stay in the area for another seven to eight years. We plan to leave in **2023**, but we will only go once we are confident that the change you have made, and the hope that you have given, will continue after we have left.

Just to say: The landscape in Bolivia means villages are far away from one another with hills and dirt tracks in between. This means it can take longer to deliver letters and cards to sponsored children and write their replies. Thank you for bearing with us.

How you have helped this year...

We've picked out a small selection of the ways you have helped to bring hope to your sponsored child and their community. The reality is that you've helped us achieve much, much more.

- * Mothers get support and training in how to breastfeed and care for their newborn babies, through new mothers' groups.
- * 15 teachers have had extra training, giving children the best possible chance to learn in class.
- * Families have been helped to start up small businesses, providing an income for them and their children.
- * Families have been shown how to grow crops in their gardens, meaning their children can enjoy nutritious meals.

- * Children's clubs now teach children about life-skills such as self-confidence, drama and teamwork.
- * 86% of new mums are now exclusively breastfeeding.
- * Health groups have been set up so families can access health services.
- Children have learned about their rights and how to protect and keep themselves safe, giving them hope for the future.

"As I never married and haven't had children of my own it's been a blessing knowing that I have helped in some way to improve the lives of children a long way away and let them


know that I care about them and love them. I will always be a sponsor and support World Vision even when I'm gone."
