#### From insecurity to confidence for Mastewal

Mastewal, 13, lives in Yilmana Densa. She was often afraid to speak out and express herself and give her opinion in the way she wanted. Mastewal's parents saw school as a waste of time, believing that their daughter's future would be better served by getting married.

After attending her school's child parliament, Mastewal plucked up the courage to speak to one of her friends about some of the difficulties she was facing.

Thanks to your help, and supported by her community and some awareness-based training, Mastewal's father and mother started to understand why Mastewal should continue going to school to gain a good education. This small step has transformed Mastewal's life. She is doing well in school and is more hopeful about her future.

"Before joining the child parliament, I didn't express my feelings or needs well within my family. But now after joining the child parliament and leading it as vice president, I have gained the ability to express my ideas without fear or frustration," says Mastewal.

"I am encouraging those women, who aren't able to express their ideas, to speak, participate and perhaps join as a parliament member. In the future, after completing my education I want to become a lawyer," says Mastewal.






# We've come a long way, and we're still making progress — *all thanks to you*.

We've been working with the community of Yilmana Densa since **2004**. Back then, children faced many problems: fear of illness; lack of food and clean water; poor sanitation; and low quality of education.

Since then, things have begun to change for the better. We've built toilets in schools and children have been taught new hygiene practices, making them much less fearful of disease; families have learned how to grow more crops, so their children are better fed and grow up healthy and strong; and reading clubs are helping more children to reach their full potential.

Despite these improvements, life is still hard for your sponsored child, and we really need your continuing support to ensure all the good we have managed to achieve for them isn't lost.

Thanks to your incredibly generous sponsorship of your sponsored child, we can stay in the area for another five to six years. We plan to leave in 2021, but we will only go once we are confident that the change you have made and the hope that you have given will continue after we have left.

### How you have helped this year...

We've picked out a small selection of the ways you have helped to bring hope to your sponsored child and their community. The reality is that you've helped us achieve much, much more.

- \* 8,608 people can now get clean water from 6 wells and 3 boreholes. Children no longer have to walk far to fetch water.
- \* Groups across II schools are teaching 8,980 children and teachers about better hygiene habits.
- Schools were equipped with 150 desks and 10 blackboards to help children learn better at school.
- \* 10 community groups are teaching farmers how to keep animals and protect them from disease, so they can feed their families.

- \* 34 reading clubs are helping 6,097 children to improve their reading skills.
- \* We're helping families learn how to grow, prepare and cook nutritious food for their children through II community groups.
- \* We're helping mothers give the best start to their babies, by supporting 8 health centres that give health check-ups and advice on feeding.
- \* We're training teachers to teach children with disabilities. 45 teachers have learnt sign language, braille and how to support the children.

know that I care about them and love them. I will always be a sponsor and support World Vision even when I'm gone."


